WISE OWL VISIT TO YEAR 6

Over the coming weeks the children of Year Six are receiving tuition from Mark Jones of the Wise Owl Money programme. The sessions will focus on the way in which money is generated, used and how it can be saved. The first lesson, during which Mark was supported by his colleague Steve, saw the children discussing how money comes into a household. The children amazed Mark with their awareness of the different ways that people may receive money and also had a solid grasp on the types of costs major purchases may amount to. The children learned all about how families save money and how a system of Spend/Save/Donate is a good way of allocating money. The coming sessions will continue to look in depth at taxes, mortgages and how banks work.

Mark also left Year Six with a challenge to raise money for Warrington Youth Club. Year Six have decided to run a 'Slime Factory' next week, where children will be able to order slime just the way they like it. The orders and money will be taken on Tuesday with the slime delivered throughout the week.

Following Mark's session he also kindly conducted a staff meeting during which he offered advice to staff about how to save money around the home and the importance of forward planning. We are all looking forward to next week's session and are very grateful to Mark and Steve for offering this voluntary service.

RECEPTION CLASS POLICE VISIT

On Tuesday, the police came into school to see the reception children. They talked to them about the different roles within the police and what jobs the police

dogs have. The children's favourite part of the visit was when they got to sit in the back of a police van in a cell and they pressed the sirens and lights. The children have continued their learning by setting up their own police station, with a prison and a police van. They have made their own uniforms and badges too. They have had great fun!

ROAD SAFETY TALK

On Thursday afternoon, Year Six were visited by a member of the road safety team with a view to their upcoming transition to secondary school. As you would expect, the Year Six children responded brilliantly to the session – demonstrating a wealth of existing knowledge as well as taking on board new ways to stay safe.


