Y2: For Internet Safety Week, Year 2 have discussed how to stay safe when online. We have watched videos to identify where others have not stayed safe, as well as discussing how to report anything they see that is inappropriate.

Lilly-May: If I saw something I didn't think was appropriate I would not look at it and tell a grown up.

Harry: If I was on a website and people started to chat, then I would turn it off and tell my mum.

Y3: For safer internet day Year 3 explored some of the dangers that comes with using the internet. They then discussed ways of how to keep themselves and others safe on the internet which they presented in the form of a poster. Some of the ways you can keep yourselves safe are:

Carlotta: Don't talk to people that you don't know

Frankie: think about what you post before you actually post it

Y4: During this week, Year 4 have been discussing the importance of staying safe on the internet focusing on issues such as cyberbullying, pop up ads and who they can turn to for help. As always, the class had some fantastic ideas and showed all our core values whilst listening to and taking part in classroom conversations. **Joe:** We learnt that if you think you or someone else is being bullied over the internet then you can report them on line or if you are unsure how to do that you can tell someone you trust.

Oliver: We learnt that to stay safe online you should tell a grown if any pop up ads appear because if you click on them they may not be what they say they are.

Ethan Y5: As it is online safety week, we have been looking at pegi ratings and what age children should be looking at things. Make sure you and your children are staying safe online.

Angus: I enjoyed passing on online safety tips to other classes.

Y6: As part of our current project of being able to present information to an

audience, the children have carried out internet research to help develop their own understanding. Children identified the importance of using the internet safely to ensure that the information they collected was both factually correct and appropriate for use. In further discussions, they were able to articulate the importance of staying safe online and knowing how to deal with scenarios in which they may feel unsafe.

Top tips to stay safe online:


Evie: If a link or pop-up appears on your screen, click to close it immediately. **Lily**: Do not share your personal information with anyone.
