

CREATIVE IPAD SESSIONS

Years Four and Five have experienced an amazing week working with Nick Amyes. Thanks to the expertise of our governor, Graham Corkin, Newchurch was fortunate enough to have hands on sessions in how to work creatively with iPads to enrich the curriculum.

Using free apps, such as Pages, Numbers and iMovie, the children created e-books to investigate their curriculum and to gain a deeper understanding of their learning. In Year Five, the space cadets, under the guidance of Commander Amyes and Admiral Corkin, used green screen technology as they journeyed across the solar system. They visited each planet, regaling the viewer with information about the other bodies orbiting the sun. Year Four built on their work in science, demonstrating their knowledge of states of matter. Their e-book included sound bites which allowed the reader to hear key facts and information.

As you can imagine, the sessions were truly engaging and we will certainly be using more of this technology in the future.


