Safer Internet Day

February 2023



This year, the theme for Safer Internet Day was 'Want to talk about it?' and was an opportunity for making space about life online. Alongside our current Computing and PSHE curriculum, children across the school took part in a range of activities to celebrate the day.



Year 5 spent some time making guides for games and apps that they use so that their parents and carers have a better understanding of the technology they are using.

Year 2 looked at how the SMART rules can help children stay safe online and made some posters to demonstrate the ways in which to stay safe online and spread awareness.



Year 3 explored a variety of images and had



to decide whether or not they were photo shopped. Children then reflected on the impact and harm that photo shopped images may have online.

Year 1 children reflected on the different ways to keep safe online and had to sort a range of scenarios based on what they thought was safe or unsafe. Children discussed the different scenarios and reflected on why things may be unsafe if you don't ask your grown up for help.



Children in Year 5 and 6 had a visit from **Detective Constable** Andrew Kevan who is

part of the crime team for Cheshire Police. He shared personal work experiences with the children and even shared details from



some cases where young people had been caught up in negative situations online. He reinforced the message that what we put online is permanent and the importance of thinking before posting and consequences of those who do not.

Computing

The children have been exploring what the internet is and what they use the internet for. They used the iPads to explore the internet safely, by playing games, using CBeebies and using Google Meet to speak to Mrs Narraway. PSHE – Belonging to a Community

This half term, Year 1 have been focussing on what it means to belong to a community. They have explored the importance of rules in society and the difference between right and wrong choices and how these affect others. They listened to stories, such as The Eagle's Egg and The Good Samaritan and discussed the choices made by the characters. The

children used drama to retell how the characters in the story argued over



who should put the egg back into the eagle's nest but overcame the problem by working as a team and listening to each other. Children also made their own comic



strips to make modern day versions of these stories.

In Science, Year One have been learning all about senses and how we use them. Children investigated all of their senses and recorded what they see, hear, feel, smell and taste. Children have also been able to recall how their senses are used in everyday life. Children have been able to consolidate their learning by building a fact file all about senses.



Computing

As well as acknowledging Safer Internet Day with different activities, Year 1 have been working on their online safety skills. Children were able to reflect on what they already know about digital safety as well as develop new learning. Children have learnt how to send an email safely and even composed some emails for some teachers around school!



PE

This half-term children have been working really hard on their gymnastics skills. Children started by learning the fundamental



shapes they can make with their bodies and even enjoyed a new game that we created using these shapes. Children progressed on to being able to make shapes to represent different animals and how they might move their bodies. The children listened carefully to music and to different sounds on the tambourine to create movements in groups. Children showed great resilience when performing in front of the rest of the class.

PSHE

The children have thoroughly engaged with their PSHE topic of 'Living in the Wider World'. Through a game of human bingo and by creating human webs, they explored how having similar likes as others can help them make connections and also make relationships stronger. They have looked at different groups that they can belong to and the children understand what it means to be part of a community. With the help of Kathleen Caves' book entitled Something Else, they discussed diversity. The children agree that diversity is something that should be celebrated and that no one should feel they need to change to fit in. Following an activity whereby the children linked arms and had to perform tasks whilst



joined, the children decided life is always better when you have friends to help you.

Finley: It was fun when we joined together and tried to stand up. We should always be helpful and kind because it makes things better.

Science



In science Year 2 have been investigating materials and their properties. The children have experimented to identify and compare the suitability of a variety of everyday

materials including wood, metal, plastic, glass, paper and cardboard for different purposes. They have also looked how some materials can be changed by squashing, bending, twisting or stretching.

Alex. Some materials can be squished and some materials, like glass are transparent, which means you can see through it.

PE

In PE, Year 2 have continued to explore different and games of tag and how the rules can be adapted for different purposes. Participating in such games have enabled the children to develop numerous skills including: cooperation, coordination, teamwork and communication. The



children particularly
enjoyed the tag games
requiring them to move in
alternative ways such as
spiders and scorpions, in
which they had to travel on

their hands and feet with their stomachs

facing the ceiling; or chain tag, whereby once tagged, the children had to form chains and work



together to catch the other children.

Jack: PE was fun when we had to pretend to be spiders and scorpions. It was a tag game where we didn't just run.

Computing

In computing this term, Year 2 have continued learning about internet safety and how it is important to behave kindly and responsibly. The children are aware it is important not to share personal information. As part of internet safety day, we looked at reasons why people post things online and why we should always

think carefully and apply to SMART rules before posting, knowing that our internet activity leaves a digital footprint. To help other people to stay safe, Year 2 created their own SMART rule posters.



Ella: Never talk to strangers online or share things with people you don't know.

Computing

In computing, Year 3 have been learning to develop their skills when using online services. They have been exploring how to search the internet accurately and the benefits and disadvantages of using autocomplete. They have looked at different websites and investigated how they can contain facts but also opinions and beliefs. They explored how to find reputable websites when searching for information online and have learned about copyright.

Meryn: We shouldn't use pictures online that have copyright because they belong to the people who created them. We would need to ask permission.

PSHE

Through their topic of belonging to a community, Year 3 have been looking at rules within different beliefs and religions. They reflected on the golden rule that these communities have in common i.e. that we should treat people how we expect to be treated. They explored the fundamental British values and how the golden rule links to these. They also looked at cultural diversity and the differences and similarities of people all around the world and the needs that they have in common to survive and be happy.

Niamh: Showing respect to people who are different to us is showing respect to diversity

PE

In outdoor PE, Year 3 have been continuing to

explore the rules of netball and have been applying their knowledge and skills in small team matches. They have also enjoyed using the apparatus equipment in indoor lessons.



Science

In their science lessons, Year 3 have been learning about forces and magnets. They started the topic by exploring a range of

objects that needed force to work and identified if the force needed was a push or pull. They went on to explore friction and investigated how different surfaces create different amounts of friction and the effect this had on the movement of a toy car.



Oscar: The felt created more friction so the car didn't travel as far.

They enjoyed using magnets to test if objects were magnetic or not and explored whether the magnets needed contact to attract or could act at a distance. They investigated how the different poles on magnets attract or repel depending on which poles are facing each other and tested different magnets to see if



some were stronger than others. They measured the distance between a paperclip and various magnets before they attracted and found that the bigger magnets weren't necessarily stronger.

Library Visits

Year 3 have been really enjoying their visits to the library. They have loved spending time choosing books and having time to read outside of the classroom. They have impressed everyone with their enthusiasm and respect

shown in the library environment and can't wait to get their very own library cards.

Computing

February marks Safer internet day. Each year, Childnet runs a competition for the best safety movie linked to Safer Internet Day. This year's theme was 'What Can We Trust Online'. The children were tasked with creating a video to explain the dangers of the internet and have used their previous learning about keeping safe online to help them produce the videos.

Beatrice: We made videos to tell people how to be safe online and ways they can protect themselves.



PSHE - Belonging to a Community.

This half term, Year 4 have been exploring what makes a community within different beliefs and religions and have investigated what is meant by shared responsibility rules.

They reflected on the term identity, looked at their own identity and other peoples around them. They spent time thinking about community and the importance of the impact different parts of the community has on everyday life. They showed respect and understood the work done by people in our community.

Sienna: We have been learning about other people's way of living and understanding that everybody lives in a different way.

Year 4 have completed their science topic 'Bright Sparks' by investigating how electrical circuits work. To start with, the children were given a number of different components and had to create circuits of their own to include switches, lights, buzzers and motors. As the unit progressed, the children were able to understand the different components of a circuit and the jobs that they do. They also spent time researching famous scientists and writing a non-chronological report of them and their scientific discoveries linked to electricity.

Edith: We did an investigation looking at conductors and insulators and why we need them to keep safe.

KS2 library visits

Recently, KS2 have been lucky enough to have frequent visits to our local library. The children have been able to spend time exploring the wide range of books on offer and take books out to continue reading them in school and home. The children have really enjoyed this opportunity and look forward to going every other week.

Noah: We were able to look around and get our own books. It was really good!

The children put in a fantastic effort for their

enterprise task. They collected sponsorship money and ran 165 laps of the school field throughout the day. So far the class have managed to raise £342.10 which will go towards their residential trip to Arête when they are in Year 6. What an

Dancing Robins

As part of their PE curriculum, Year Five have been developing their

knowledge and skills in dance this half term. Throughout February, the children responded to musical stimulus to create sequences which showed



a range of systematic and thoughtful motifs.
Linking these phases together, the children looked to change their height, tempo, direction and personnel along with incorporating balances and lifts. From basic steps to advanced gymnastics, the children developed dances which were brilliant and uniquely matched to their own personalities. We all loved watching the finished pieces.

building this month as they looked at irreversible changes and how materials react. Mixing acids and alkalis, the children waited eagerly to see the canisters burst open – the tell-tale sign that a new

material had been created. They also looked at dissolving, getting to grips with solutes, solutions, solvents and solubility. They really are top scientists.



Harry: We have learned about materials and how we can create a chemical reaction. I know that you can change the state of matter like heating a solid up so that it melts into a liquid.

Keeping safe

The children have worked on their online safety this month, including Safer Internet Day. Looking

at their online footprint, the reputation and image they portray online and how they can respond to negative behaviour, the children demonstrated superb knowledge and maturity. The ever-changing and limitless



potential of the online world makes it difficult to navigate but the children have shown that they are SMART online. They also had a talk from Cheshire Police about keeping themselves safe with new technologies and the responsibilities they face when they are 10 years old.

Community

Whether it is school, the village, nationally or beyond, we are all a part of a community and Year Five have been looking at finding their place in these groups. 
Computing

Online social influences have been the focus of our computing topic this half term. The children have explored many strategies from marketing campaigns and social networking sites which encourage users to think or act in a particular way. The children were quick to identify and condemn the ways in which gender stereotyping is still prevalent online and particularly in advertising toys. They also thoroughly enjoyed an activity involving the fictitious land of 'Molassia'. On the surface, it appeared to be an authentic website but after a little digging, the children soon realised it was all made up information. The lesson learnt here was to not always trust everything you read online. Finally, all of this was consolidated in a talk from Cheshire police about the consequences of the misuse of social media. Our robins have really developed their understanding of their digital footprint and pleased us with their levels of maturity. Freya: The lesson about Molassia was fascinating because it appeared to be factual information. I

was surprised to find out it had all been made up and it taught me not to believe everything I read online.

Science

Linked with our English text 'Island', which details the life cycle of the Galapagos Islands, Year 6 have been learning about evolution and inheritance. They soon became familiar with the work of the famous geologist, Charles Darwin, and were able to understand his Theory of
