This half term the children have thoroughly enjoyed being outside, learning with their friends. They have been using their imagination, building dens, using blocks and creating new and exciting worlds.

Art - Printing

In art this term the children investigated printing using 2d shapes. They have learnt the skill of dipping the 2d shapes in the paint and then pressing the shape onto the card or paper. The children were given a range of shapes and 3d blocks with which they created different patterns involving a range of colours and shapes.







English - Silly Doggy



In English this half term the children are reading the story of Silly Doggy. Using the text they have been researching facts and writing sentences about different animals that have four legs, a wet nose, a tail and fur.

In **English**, Year 1 have started to explore the text **Toys in Space.** The story follows a group of toys who are left abandoned outside by their owner. As night falls, the Wonder Doll tells a story of how the toys are beamed into space by an alien space craft! There they meet an alien who is looking for his own lost toy.

Year 1 found their own box of lost toys in the classroom and used their reading skills to work out where the toys had come from.



They identified similarities between the toys they found and the ones in the story and wrote character descriptions. They used their inference skills to write what the toys in the story could see, hear and smell and even went outside and lay in the grass to explore how the toys would be feeling and what they would say at being left outside.

Darcey: The blue rabbit felt terrified and

worried.

Hugh: The toys felt unhappy and very scared.

Weaving

In Art, Year 1 have been exploring weaving. They looked at the patterns on different weaves and identified types of weaves in clothing items using a microscope.



They then made their own plain and twill weaves and worked collaboratively to make a satin weave on a frame. They also looked at how colours can be linked to mood and emotions and made a weave using colours of their choice.

Outdoor Learning

Year 1 have been enjoying the warmer, brighter weather outdoors. In science, as part of their learning on plants, they went on a nature walk to explore what flowers and trees they could see around school. They then made sketches of what they found and identified the names by looking at colours, petals and shapes of leaves.



In computing they went on a hunt around school to find and scan QR codes to reveal parts of a computer. They also spent some time outdoors practising taking quality photographs and then had the challenge of uploading and saving them onto the computer!

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Sunshine and Sunflowers





Year 2 took their learning outdoors to plant some lovely sunflowers as part of their new science topic 'Living Things and their Habitats'. They looked at how important it is to provide the right

habitat for the flowers to grow in, and they will make sure to keep on top of looking after them!

They are also going to keep a class diary so they can see how much progress they make.

They each planted their very own sunflower seed, as well as some extra flowers to keep their outdoor area looking beautiful! They are making sure that they give the sunflowers plenty of water and take them outside to give



them some sunshine too! The children all enjoyed getting their hands dirty and they look forward to watching them grow.

Follow the instructions

Over the last couple of weeks, Year Two have been looking at instructions. First, they followed the instructions to make Angel Delight, and then gave some verbal instructions to Miss Igglesden on how to make a sandwich! It was very important that they gave her very clear instructions because she was silly when they said 'put the ham in between the two slices of bread' and she put on the whole packet!

Year 2 created some wonderful pieces of art using a range of printing methods in the style of Charles Rennie Mackintosh. First, they experimented with printing using a range of different objects. Then they went on to create their very own printing tools to create some amazing and wonderful patterns.



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Plant Hunters



This term, Year 3 have taken their learning outdoors. As part of our current science topic 'Plants', the children went on the hunt for different varieties of plants. The children were tasked with identifying as many plants and flowers within the school grounds as possible using the checklists provided. The children had great conversations when identifying each variety and they found all but one type of tree which is very impressive!


Prefect Printing

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Outdoor learning - Food Webs



Year 4 have taken their learning outdoors to create their own food webs, which is linked to their science topic 'Living things and their habitats'.

They had to work in groups to talk about where living things got their energy from and who would be eaten by what.



They also discussed whether they would be producers, consumers, predators or prey and what effect it would have on the food web if something affected it, like a plant or animal becoming extinct.

Art - Printing perfection

The children have been recreating city landscapes in the style of Dan Mather. They discussed what aspects they liked and disliked about the artist before they chose a picture of a city to create stencils and print with.








Oscar H - I liked how we cut out stencils of different cities and used different coloured paint to print our own and we learnt which buildings were in the different cities.

MARKING TIME

how it ended chronologically tied to other historical empires. The rest of the cohort studied the key events in Mayan history: the



rise of farming, induction of the written word and the ill-timed arrival of the Spanish conquistadors.

POP PRINTS

Year Five's half termly arts week was an exciting one as the children embarked on their printing studies. Investigating the role of artists in shaping the cultures they are

part of, the budding printers used gouges, brayers and acrylics to make linocut prints.



They demonstrated excellent artistic skills, understanding of how to work safely and knowledge of how artists gain inspiration from the world around them.

CURSES AND HAPPY ENDINGS


Year Five have left behind the frozen wastes of Antarctica and have headed deep into the woods and forests. Their class text is The

Amazing Art




Inspired by the beautiful print-work of the famous artist, Bridget Riley, Year 6 have produced beautifully eye-catching prints.

English



This half term, the children are exploring the text, 'Island' by Jason Chin which is a fascinating biography about the life of the Galapagos Islands. The book details Charles Darwin's voyage to the Galapagos to further understand and progress his ideas of evolution. This also links in perfectly with our science topic, 'Inheritance and Evolution' and has given the children a deeper understanding of what can be a challenging topic to comprehend. Through their learning, the children are building up to creating their own information text about the Galapagos Islands.
